Subject: Considerations for Land Use

Dear Planning Advisory Committee:

I have two points I would like to share with you today.

1. I recently purchased this EMF Reader. It's a TriField TF2. It can measure the Radio/microwave (RF) frequencies from cell phone towers.

As you aware, there are two towers along the 103 as you leave the Exit near Barrington and head towards Shelburne. Yesterday I took the reader along for the drive.

According to the pamphlet, "What is a 'safe' level?" it says:

0.200 mW/m² (field measurement)

or 1.000 mW/m² (peak measurement)

As I drove by the towers what are the readings?

It ranged from 1.6 - 6.8 for the field measurement and 11.435 is the peak. The peak was basically 11X the safe level.

There are a couple of homes near these towers. I wonder if they know that their homes are near dangerous levels of RF frequencies.

You may want to consider the placement of such towers. I would estimate that the readings increased about ½ km from the towers but would have to do it again for more accuracy. In Shelburne there is one very close to the school in a residential area. This isn't good in my opinion.

2. Climate Change isn't what is going on...

I feel that governments are focusing on the wrong terminology and therefore misleading people away from what is really happening.

This video touches on many aspects that I feel are important as we live in a banana belt here in SW Nova Scotia. There are well-known 11 year shifts in weather having to do with the sun. <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=rBwUQIHus7I>

There is a movement for the UN to turn us AWAY from growing our own food. Thus, when I read your land use and agriculture post on Facebook an alarm went off.

Some of the boundaries that you mention in the draft are excessive in my opinion. There is an urban farm in California which uses just about every aspect of their two acre lot to produce food. If more people would do this we would be more self-reliant. <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=7IbODJiEM5A>

I don't think that it is fair to punish all when this concept can be done right. Even manure when it is mixed with soil has no smell. Please visit some of the homesteads so that you can see what people are doing and really consider the rules that you make - ask yourself, what else is possible to make things work and be progressive.
