MAIN BUILDING - GENERAL REGULATIONS

The Exhibition will be held in Barrington at the Exhibition Grounds on Thursday Aug. 20th, Friday Aug. 21st, Saturday Aug 22nd & Sunday, Aug. 23rd, 2015. The main building will be open Wednesday Aug. 19th for entering exhibits from 12 noon to 8 p.m.

NO exhibits will be accepted after 8 p.m. as the judging of the exhibits will begin at this time. The fairgrounds will open to the public at 3:00 pm Thursday through Sunday.

Judges for the Main Building exhibits will arrive at the main building by 8 p.m. to receive the judge's books and supplies, and then proceed to award prizes. On completing the judging, etc. they will sign the books and return them to the Manager's Office.

Poultry and small animals must be entered between 5:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m., Thursday August 20th. Small animal judging will begin early Friday morning at which time the barn will be closed. All articles for competition, except livestock, should be the production or manufacture of the exhibitor and made in the current year.

Exhibits will now be accepted from all residents of Nova Scotia.

Entry must be made in the name of the bona fide owner. In all cases exhibitors will be considered the owners for the duration of the Exhibition. Proof of ownership may be requested unless this rule is observed, no prize shall be awarded.

Prizes:

There will be 1st and 2nd prizes in all categories and special prizes.

SPECIAL PRIZES should be picked up when collecting the exhibits on Sunday.

Please note that vegetables have a junior class and we have added a Christmas section and a few more new ones. Please take a look.

Exhibits are not to be removed before 4 p.m. on Sunday and must be picked up no later than 7:00 p.m., the Exhibition Committee will not be responsible for exhibits remaining on the grounds.

The exhibition committee will also not be responsible for the sale of the exhibits marked "for sale".

Special employees will be in charge with the aid of the police, to protect property and ensure order.

While the Committee give all assistance in its power, it will not make payment thereof;

Each exhibitor will receive an entry tag for each article and such should be attached to the article and specify class, section and Exhibitors number.

No person shall be allowed to enter the competition more than one specimen or required quantity in any one section.

Exhibitors shall, if required, make a declaration that the articles exhibited are in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Exhibition and if he refused to make such declaration upon request, all premiums awarded will be forfeited.

Exhibitors must provide transportation of articles to and from the Exhibition Grounds.

Any person who shall attempt to interfere with a judge while in charge of his/her duties, or who shall attempt to influence said judge shall forfeit your right to any prize and will be dealt with as the committee may deem necessary.

The judge's decisions are final and they shall not enter into discussions with exhibitors regarding their result.

In all cases the Committee reserves the right to reject or accept any entry. Under no circumstances will animals, which are dangerous, be admitted. If such are entered in error they will be removed by the Committee.

No information on prizes will be given out by telephone.

If there is an animal show dogs must be leashed and removed immediately following the show.

Ox Haul Rules

1. All teamsters taking part in contest must draw for placing.
2. All teams must be walked onto the scales and the teamster may be asked to produce weight when drawing for placing.
3. **Any teamster fighting will be removed from the premises.**
4. Only one teamster for each team, but a helper is allowed when hooking on the drag. Teamster cannot be changed.
5. Any teamster found to be under the influence of alcohol or drugs will not be permitted to compete in the event.
6. Whips may be used, but the lash must be kept in hand. No cruelty to animals will be tolerated.
7. No profane language is to be used. Teamsters committing offenses will be forced to forfeit their right to compete.
8. A time limit of 15 minutes will be allowed for each team.
9. Minimum starting load will be an amount equal to the weight of the team.
10. Each team will have three starts to move the drag a distance of 3 feet.
11. A haul will be considered a start when the teamster asks the team to come ahead, NOT when standing to the side, UNLESS the teamster taps his team with the whip to startle the cattle. If they turn and step over the line, while the teamster is NOT asking them to move, they WILL NOT BE disqualified.
12. In the event that there are two teams weighing the same weight and hauling the same load, the teamster who hauled first will place over the teamster who hauled next, because the teamster who hauls next knows what he/she has to haul to place and has fair opportunity to beat the first team's percentage.
13. A team stepping over the lines while in hauling position will be disqualified.
14. In all cases the Judge's decision will be final.
15. **NO Oxen will be excepted on grounds before 2pm on Friday.**

Rules and Regulations for Light Horse Classes

- This is a non sanctioned show, however it follows Rules and Regulations set by the American Quarter Horse Association
- In case where there is some questions concerning the rules governing a particular class, **The Judge Ruling Will Be Final**
- Any one 18 years of age and under must wear protective headgear with an attached harness while mounted anywhere on the show grounds
- Use of helmets by riders 19 years of age and over is optional (unless otherwise stated), but is recommended for these riders in all timed events
- No stallions are permitted in any lead line, youth or walk/trot class
- Height of horses – 14.2 hands and over. Ponies – under 14.2 hands
- Horses age shall be calculated as of January 1 of the current year
- Horses 5 years of age and under can be ridden with 2 hands on the reins and a snaffle bit without shanks or bosal in any class. All other horses entered in western classes (excluding gymkhana) are to be ridden with one hand on the reins and only one finger between the reins, unless otherwise stated.
- Age of rider shall be determined by Rider's age as of January 1 of the current year
- Lead line – Rider is 8 years of age and under (at the discretion of the parent/guardian along with the judge), Youth – Rider is 8-12 years of age, Junior – Rider is 13-17 years of age, Senior is 18 years of age and greater.
- Lead line – Rider is 8 years of age and under (at the discretion of the parent/guardian along with the judge), Youth – Rider is 8-12 years of age, Junior – Rider is 13-17 years of age, Senior is 18 years of age and greater.
- **Back number must be visible at all times.** If you choose to place numbers on a saddle pad is must be on both sides of the saddle pad. Riders will receive a warning for the first offence about incorrect back numbers or not wearing the back number, after that it may result in elimination of the class.
- Timed Events. Any Rider crossing the start line without a hat or helmet in place will be eliminated. Deliberately tipping hat or helmet after crossing start line will not be tolerated. First time you will receive a warning, second time will result in elimination.
- Western Classes (gymkhana and performance) – Horses are to be shown in western tack and

handler or rider to be in western attire which consists of a long sleeve shirt, long pants, western boots and western hat or a helmet.

- No martingales, tie down, nose bands, draw reins, mechanical hackamores, crops, splint boots or bandages are allowed in any western pleasure, trail, equitation, command or maritime bred class.
- In classes where a crop is allowed, maximum length will be 75 cm.
- Fall of horse or/and rider in any gymkhana class or race results in elimination.
- Entries will be processed in the order in which they are received.
- Class fees and horse entry fee must accompany entry form or they will be subjected to post entry fees, unless otherwise stated. There will not be any switching of entries from one class to another.
- Class fees and horse entry fees will not be refunded unless a veterinary certificate is provided.
- Exhibitors must notify the light horse officials if they are scratching from a class.
- BIT RULE. At the discretion of the Judge or Ring Master, bits may be checked in any class. Any bit that is illegal or inhumane will not be allowed.
- Flat classes which both horses and ponies have entered, at the judges discretion, may ask the horses to lope or canter separately from the ponies.
- Horses and ponies must be under control at all times. Any entry felt not to be in control may be asked to leave the ring at the judge's discretion.
- Show officials reserve the right to change the program or classes if deemed necessary.
- The rules and regulations of the show are automatically agreed to by the exhibitor by signing their entry form.
- No bringing in horses before Thursday August 20th.
- Riders and horses what don't have liability insurance and waiver signed will not be allow to ride.
